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Trueblood Case History

- ► Historical and recurrent problems with delays in competency services over more than a decade
- Suit was first filed by a public defender and her client in August of 2014
- Advocacy groups later join suit and amend complaint to include a class action
- Plaintiffs sought several preliminary injunctions
- Summary judgment in December of 2014, but case not fully decided
- Trial in March of 2015

Trueblood Class Definition and Timeline

► The class definition treated competency evaluations and restorations the same:


All persons who are now, or will be in the future, charged with a crime in the State of Washington and: (a) who are ordered by a court to receive competency evaluation or restoration services through DSHS; (b) who are waiting in jail for those services; and (c) for whom DSHS receives the court order.

► The court's order: U.S. Constitution requires WA to complete evaluations and admissions within 7 days. The seven days began when the criminal court signs the order, regardless of when it was transmitted.

Requirements of April 2015 Order:

- ► Achieve 7 day standard within 9 months
- ► Long-term plan to sustain compliance
- Oversight
 - Court appointed Monitor
 - Monthly reports to the Monitor
 - Quarterly Monitor reports to the Court
 - Court hearings as needed

Resources Needed to Succeed

\$40.5 Million Dollar Investment



- ≥ 40% more Forensic Evaluators (13)
- **≻65%** more Beds (90)



>\$4.8 million for Non-Felony Diversion Services



- ➤11 Staff for new Office of Forensic Mental Health Services
- ➤ Statutory requirements for system partners⁷

7 months left...so many tasks to complete!

- ▶ 72 beds in two state hospitals
- ▶ 30 beds in new Residential Treatment Facility
- Establish Office of Forensic Mental Health Services
- Establish data collection and reporting structure
- ► Facilitate cross-system collaboration and improvements
- Achieve substantial compliance with the 7-day standard
- And so on...



Appeal of the Court's Order

- Appeal challenged only one portion of the class: competency evaluations
- ▶ DSHS did not seek a stay of the court's order during appeal
- ► Even on a relatively quick timeline, a decision from the court of appeals took more than a year
- ► Although the district court's decision was reversed, the case was sent back to the district court to reconsider the issue
- ► Revised order: evaluations to be completed within 14 days, still calculated from signing of order




Interim Legal Developments

- Extension requested in December of 2015
- Court grants request to extend compliance deadline to end of May, 2016
- In granting extension, the court included numerous specific requirements
- Court begins to hold regular hearings to address compliance and progress
- Increased involvement of the court and court monitor

Progress made--demand explodes





Request for Contempt


- ► Following the extended May, 2016 deadline, Plaintiffs ask the court to hold the Department in contempt
- ► Federal contempt law is unfriendly to complex cases like this one
- Despite extraordinary efforts, because substantial compliance remained elusive, the Department was found in contempt
- Plaintiffs also requested that the court order numerous specific actions, which were rejected

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




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Transforming Washington's Behavioral Health System



State Hospital improvement investments to help people recover and return to th community more quickly

- Peer Supports and Substance Use Disorder (SUD) Treatment
- Financial Workers and Case Managers to help individuals transition out of hospital
- SIA Improvements to meet federal standards

The Future from a Legal Perspective

- ► The major legal questions of this case are answered
- ► Appeal of ancillary issues, including attorney's fees, still pending (\$2.2 M to date)
- Litigation focused on the Department's residential facilities will continue
- ► Regular status hearings will continue
- Level of involvement of court monitor continues to increase
- ► Possibility of additional contempt orders
